## **BUTTERFLY CLASS**

What a whirlwind the month of January was! This month we went "back to the basics". We learned to follow direction during small group activities, about personal safety and the importance of following

limits to keep us safe during playtime and through reading books and stories. Your little Butterflies have been working so hard on everything from their basic skills to ready them for kindergarten, to practicing kindness, respect and caring for their friends, teachers and the outside world! We are so proud with how far they are coming! They're going to be ready for kindergarten before we know it!

We work really hard to keep our classroom clean and disinfected on a daily basis. Now that we are in the thick of cold and flu season, we are asking that everyone remembers to:

- Keep your children home if they are running a temperature of 100 degrees or over, they are vomiting, have diarrhea, major green colored runny nose or severe cough. This is not just to keep other children and teachers well, but it's also to help your child heal. Rest and lots of fluids are key ingredients in the healing process.
- Take your child's blankets home to wash, EVERY week at the end of their scheduled week, and remember to return them the following week. This not only helps to cut down on germs, but it also makes rest time much more comfy and cozy for your child.
- Make sure that your child ALWAYS has a FULL set of extra clothes in their cubbies. This
  includes sock and of course underwear. We also encourage you to bring your child a warm coat,
  rain coat and rain boots to leave at school if possible. The weather is so unpredictable, and we
  do go outside in all types of weather. We want all of our Butterflies to be warm and dry.

Check out our new column! This Q & A will be created by our staff as a teamwe will take questions you have about challenging situations with your child (please submit your question in our Dear Teacher box in front of Virginia's office) and come up with an answer together.

Dear Teacher,

- Q.) I have a 4 year old and he seems to be having some jealousy issues with his 13-month-old sibling. The 4-year-old is very territorial of his possessions and even becomes aggressive if the little one (innocently) grabs one of his toys. Help!
- A) What a challenging situation! 4-year-olds are at a stage where they are exerting their independence, developing empathy towards others by learning about feelings that everyone has, which includes learning how to share. 1-year-olds are exploring and learning about EVERYTHING through touching, mouthing and reaching for anything in sight. They have no idea that 'things' have significance and value to others.

Try to talk to your 4-year-old about the development of his sibling and how his little sibling just doesn't understand the idea of possessing something (at a time when there is no conflict going on.) At the same time, show value to your 4-year-olds feelings on the matter and create a space (up high) that the 1-year-old cannot access. Your 4-year-old can select his most prized possessions to keep in this safe space. There are many great children's books that you could read to your 4-year-old to learn how to deal with a younger sibling. Try, Franklin and Harriet by Paulette Burgeois or ask your librarian for other books like this. Aggression could also indicate his dissatisfaction for other matters regarding his young sibling. He may miss the 1:1 time he used to get with you. See if you can find time and support to give the children time alone with you individually. It can be hard for a 4-year-old to adjust to sharing a parent!

If your child is still having aggression issues, you may consider finding a therapist, one that specializes in play therapy to try to get your little guy to open up about what is really on his mind. Please let us know if you need a referral for a therapist!

## Phonics Fact Sheet for Parents

Phonics is in the news! Here are some phonics-related facts and concepts that will help you understand the developing abilities of your preschool aged child:

### Hearing the Sounds That Make Up Words

Phonics helps children in kindergarten, first, and second grade as they learn to read. As is true in many areas of academic learning, the ability to learn and use phonics in the early grades depends on skills and abilities children begin to develop before they enter grade school:

- Phonics involves the relationship between printed letter and the sounds they stand for. (The letter B corresponds to the sound /b/).
- To understand these letter-sound relationships, children first need to develop awareness of the sounds that make up words. This is called *phonological awareness*.
- Learning and using phonics depends on children's ability to hear *phonemes*, the very smallest sounds in words. Phonemes are represented in print by single letters (the letter t stands for the sound /t/) or, in some cases, by letter combinations (the letters sh stand for the sound /sh/; the letters ck stand for the sound /k/).

## How Preschool Phonics Learning Begins: Rhyming, Alliteration, and Writing

- While preschoolers are not able to distinguish all the phonemes in the words they hear and say, they can hear and identify the ends of words that sound the same, for example, dog, log, bog. These are commonly known as *rhymes*. They are also able to distinguish the beginning phonemes of words that begin with the same sound, for example, Tom Tit Tot. These are called alliterations.
- As preschool children hear and say familiar nursery rhymes, pick out the rhyming words, and make up their own rhymes, they distinguish and purposefully play with word-ending sounds.
- As preschool children say, hear, and make up alliterations, they distinguish beginning letter sounds, a skill necessary for learning phonics.
- As preschool children begin to sound out and write letters in familiar words (saying /m/ as they
  write the letter M for MOM), they use phonics (letter-sound relationships) to help them spell.

Since experiences like these with rhyming, alliteration, and writing are a frequent part of our active learning preschool program, you can be assured that your child is getting the phonics-related activities she or he needs!
